



or poster board. The scale of your mask should be life-size or slightly larger. Draw a very faint vertical line through the center of your mask. This will help keep it symmetrical. Sketch the facial features and any other details onto your mask. Use acissors to cut out the mask. If you'd like, you can also cut holes for features such as the eyes and mouth using an X-acto knife. If you are using cardboard, turn your mask over and score the back carefully with several vertical lines. This will help the mask fit the contours of your face.

TIP: Your mask doesn't have to be an ovel or a circle.

Your sketches should indicate areas that you want to emphasize with three-dimensional elements. Then make a list of materials that symbolize your theme. Project Progress:

Ceramics I students are currently finishing up coil pots. **Coil pots** are created by making ropes of clay and scoring/slipping them together to create tall, interesting pots. Some of the project requirements include using either exposed or directional coils, creating a pot with dimensions of at least 10" x 5", and demonstrating shape/ form in their finished pots. **See some of the great examples below!**
