## Reading/ Language Arts

December 5th - December 9th

2<sup>nd</sup> Grade News

This week we will begin reading an informational text about trees. The text features several diagrams, so we will focus on how this special text feature adds to our understanding of the text. We will discuss how we can gather new information from a diagram that is not included in the words, or how a diagram can help clarify and deepen what we already read. If you come across a diagram in one of your informational texts at home, try asking these questions: *What is this diagram about? How would you use this diagram to locate information? How does this diagram make information easier to find and understand?* 

Our phonics skill this week will be vowel digraphs that make the long-o sound: *o, oa* and *ow.* 

In writing, we will work on identifying and capitalizing proper nouns, including holidays, product names, and geographic names

## Math

This week we will focus on solving word problems, including two-step word problems that involve both 2-digit addition and 2-digit subtraction. We are trying to break the habit of seeina numbers in a word problem and quickly throwing them into an equation. Instead, we should be analyzing the problem and really thinking about the situation that is being presented in order to form a **plan** to solve the problem.

## Science & Social Studies

In social studies, we have been working on our Native American unit. The students are rotating to each of the 2<sup>nd</sup> grade classrooms to learn about different Native American groups, including the Iroquois, Inuit, Hopi, Sioux, and Pueblo.
